

LOVE (luv), *v.* to regard with affection;—*n.* an affection of the mind, caused by that which delights; courtship; the object loved; fondness.

LOVELY (lov'ly), *a.* exciting love; amiable; beautiful.

LOW (lo), *a.* deep; poor; cheap; *ad.* with a low voice; cheaply;—*v.* to bellow as an ox.

LOWLY (lo'ly), *a.* humble; meek; mean.

LOYAL (loy'al), *a.* true to one's country, love, or duty.

LOZENGE (loz'enz), *n.* a rhomb; a small cake; an ornament; a form of medicine.

LUBBER (lub'er), *n.* a heavy, gawky, idle fellow.

LUBRICITY (lu-'brix'e-tye), *n.* slipperiness; smoothness.

LUCENT (lu'sent), *a.* bright; shining; splendid.

LUCERNE (loo-'sarn'), *n.* a clover-like plant; alfalfa.

LUCID (lu'sid), *a.* clear; distinct; glittering; bright.

LUCIFER (lu'se-'fer), *n.* the devil; the morning star.

LUCK (luk), *n.* chance; good or ill fortune.

LUDICROUS (lu'de-'kru), *a.* laughable; ridiculous.

LUFF (luf), *n.* the part toward the wind;—*v.* to turn the head of a ship toward the wind.

LUG (lug), *v.* to pull or carry with labor;—*n.* a heavy load; a square sail.

LUGGAGE (lug'aj), *n.* heavy baggage.

LUGUBRIOUS (lu-'gub're-us), *a.* sorrowful; mournful.

LUKEWARM (luk'warm), *a.* moderately warm; indifferent; tepid.

LULL (lul), *v.* to compose to rest; to subside.

LULLABY (lu'la-by), *n.* a song to quiet infants.

LUMBAGO (lum-'ba'go), *n.* a rheumatic pain about the loins and back.

LUMBER (lum'ber), *n.* useless and bulky things; sawn timber;—*v.* to heap carelessly together.

LUMINOUS (lu-'me-nus), *a.* enlightened; shining.

LUMP (lump), *n.* a mass of matter; the gross;—*v.* to throw into a mass; to take in the whole.

LUNACY (lu'ma-'see), *n.* insanity; mental derangement.

LUNAR (lu'mar), *a.* pertaining to the moon.

LUNATIC (lu'ma-'tik), *a.* affected with lunacy;—*n.* a person whose insanity is supposed to be affected by the moon.

LUNCH (lunch), or **LUNCHEON** (lun'shun), *n.* food taken between regular meals.

LUNG (lung), *pl.* lungs;—*n.* the organs of respiration.

LUNT (lunt), *n.* a match-cord with which to fire a cannon.

LURCH (lurch), *n.* a heavy roll of a ship; forlorn condition;—*v.* to roll to one side.

LURE (lur), *n.* that which allures;—*v.* to entice.

LURID (lu'rid), *a.* gloomy; dismal; purplish.

LURK (lurk), *v.* to lie in wait; to lie concealed.

LUSCIOUS (lush'us), *a.* delicious; sweet, or rich.

LUST (lust), *n.* evil propensity; carnal desire;—*v.* to desire carnally or improperly.

LUSTRE (lus'ter), *n.* splendor; renown; brightness; a kind of lamp.

LUSTRATE (lus'trat), *v.* to cleanse or purify.

LUSTY (lus'tic), *a.* strong; large; healthy.

LUTE (lu'te), *n.* a stringed instrument of music; a kind of clay;—*v.* to coat with lute.

LUTHERAN (lu'ther-an), *a.* relating to Luther and his followers.

LUXATE (luk'sat), *v.* to displace; to dislocate.
