## There vs. They're vs. Their

Use **there** to name a place, thing or existence of thing

Example: Stand over **there**.

Use **they're** when you mean **they are**.

Examples: **They're** my friends.

Use **their** when you are using it as a possessive (relating to them/themselves).

Example: **Their** clothes are colorful.

### Hints:

Use **they're** if you can replace the apostrophe with the word are.

Use **their** if you can replace it with our. It is almost always followed by a noun.
