

**NASTURTIUM**  
Dwarf Nasturtium grows but about one foot high and are very useful for bedding and retaining attractive and range from a pale yellow through all shades of orange and red to a dark maroon. Many of them have spotted, or striped leaves. They are especially apt in poor soil and are not troubled by insects or dry weather. Keep flowers picked daily and they will bloom profusely all the season.

**Culture**—Plant the seeds about the tenth of April, in rows that will stand a foot apart each way.

**Morning Glory.** This handsome, free flowering climber is much suitable for covering arbors, windows and trellises, or hiding stumps and other rustic or unsightly objects. It needs no care if sown in a bed for the vines.

The flowers are most brilliant in the morning. Their colors are many, from white to dark blue and purple.

It is a hardy annual, growing ten feet high.

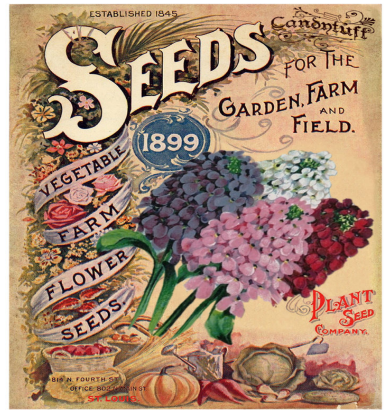
**Rose**  
Culture Annual. Sow out of doors when danger from frost is over, in the open ground where they are to flower. The soil should be well pulverized and the seed covered to a depth of about four times their size. Press down firmly with a board and when plants appear, thin out if necessary to avoid crowding. For early flowering, seed should be sown in doors in boxes or in a hot bed and transplanted to the open ground when the weather conditions are suitable.

**Sweet Peas.**  
All the New Fancy Colors Mixed in Every Package.

These have long been favorite flowers and are very productive. Nothing blooms in greater abundance, and few flowers are so satisfactory. They like cool, moist weather and should be planted early in the spring. Some have failed to grow. Sweet Peas, and to the majority of cases it is because they are sown too late. Some early and success is certain. Plant early, about four inches deep, knowing that at that time, the more they are cut, the more flowers they will produce. Grows to 6 feet high.

**Pansies.** These lovely flowers are favorites with every one. No one can help admiring them when grown from such choice seed as we send out. A small bed of Pansies in rich, cool soil, perfectly shaded, will reward and render affords a wonderful brilliancy and variety of color.

We have the following varieties, all saved from the choicest and largest flowers and comprising all shades of color:



**Candytuft** is known and cultivated by almost every one. A bed of it in colors particularly of the White Rocket variety look well and bloom profusely. It is much used for cut flowers in bouquets.

When sown in April, it blooms from July to September, and some of the sorts bloom till frost comes.
